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LAKE REGULATIONS - CHANGES IN BOLD

SCUBA DIVING

No person shall participate in SCUBA diving at Raintree Lake unless person is taking part in a training/rescue effort by City or State Officials. The only exception to this is for underwater inspection/repair. This may include dock bracing and/or framework, underwater stump removal or maintenance of underwater piping or valves. If underwater inspection/repair is desired all safety precautions required for SCUBA diving is mandatory. Divers must be certified. Written permission must be obtained from the Raintree Lake Manager or their designee. The equipment being inspected/repaired shall be quarantined such that no access to the equipment is permitted. Additionally, a safety observer shall be stationed to restrict access. The Water Patrol shall be stationed in proximity to restrict any water traffic from accessing the area. Amended 2011. Amended Sept. 9, 2014.

PROCEDURE FOR ENFORCEMENT OF COVENANTS PARKING TRUCKS, BOATS, AND TRAILERS - *CHANGES IN BOLD*

C. If violation is not corrected, property owner and/or lessee shall be notified of suspension of membership rights for thirty (30) days. And a five hundred dollars (\$500) fine shall be imposed for the first violation. Thereafter, each five day period of disregard the fine shall be seven hundred and fifty (\$750) dollars. Amended Sept. 9, 2014.

COMMERCIAL AND/OR DEVELOPER MONUMENTATION

Pylons and wall made of:

Hand tooled limestone - color matched square cut, color Dover gray

Footings - 3000 lb. test concrete with #4 steel reinforcing 12" on center

<u>Fabricated sheet metal roof cap</u> – standing seam metal canopy, 24 ga. Paintgrip, painted satin black automotive grade acrylic polyurethane. (Canopy to have removable top for electrical access & service).

50 watt down light fixture - recessed 50 watt White LED down light. (If determined to be needed)

<u>Cast bronze plaque</u> (Final artwork & design to be determined). Smooth reverse with satin face, recessed single line border, pebble finished background painted black baked enamel with U.V. clear lifetime finish. (Guaranteed not to tarnish, fade, or discolor).

12" reverse halo channel LED letters, mounted on wall, UL approved. All backlit LED sign letters will be UL listed and individually labeled per the city of Lee's Summits' electrical requirements. OCTOBER GARDENING TIPS:

Next spring, don't be haunted by thoughts of tasks you should have completed in October to ensure a good start to the growing season.

Here are just a few tips:

- * Clean-up involves removing vines, plant debris and a final weeding. If weeds are left in the garden they will go to seed producing hundreds of new weeds next year.
- * Rake and remove leaves from under your rose bushes. This will eliminate a prime "breeding ground" for insect pests and fungal diseases like powdery mildew.
- Dig up and store all summer bulbs, such as dahlias, cannas, elephant ears. Clip off the green growth, then store in a dry, cool location.
- * Mulch with three to five inches of straw, sawdust, pine needles or wood chips to protect plant roots from severe winter temperatures.
- Shut down your water garden, moving aquatic plants indoors to ensure their survival.

PLAYING IT SAFE ON HALLOWEEN

Motorists:

- Enter and exit driveways carefully.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs.
- Use caution for children running out from between parked cars.
- Pay extra attention for children in dark clothing.
- Remind your teen drivers to use extra caution.
- If going to a Halloween party, make sure that you do not drink and drive! Use a designated driver if alcohol is being consumed. Alcohol, even in small amounts slows reaction time and dulls the senses. ***Slow down and stay alert***

Homeowners:

- Do not let anyone into your home that you do not know.
- Keep walkways, driveways, sidewalks, and yard clear of obstacles that can cause a person to fall.
- Do not light candles around walkways. If you would like luminaries or to light a jack-o-lantern, use a battery operated light source or glow stick.
- Check exterior lights and replace burned-out bulbs.
- Homeowners should leave the porch light on so that children will know it is all right to trick-or-treat at your home.
- Consider fire safety when decorating. Do not overload electrical outlets with holiday lighting or special affects.
- Confine, segregate or otherwise prepare household pets for an evening of frightful sights and sounds. Be sure that all pets are wearing collars and proper identification tags. Restrain pets so they do not inadvertently jump or bite trick-or-treaters.
- Be suspicious of people who come to your home more than once because they may be "casing" it for burglary.
- Report any suspicious or criminal activity to the police, Dial "911" for emergencies and 969-7390 for non-emergencies. The police may be very busy, so do not expect them to respond in five minutes.

Tips for a safe Halloween:

- Go only to well-lit homes and remain on porches rather than entering homes.
- Travel in small groups and be accompanied by an adult.
- Bring treats home before eating them so parents can inspect them.
- Use flashlights with fresh batteries or glow sticks.
- Cross streets at corner and do not walk between parked cars.
- Watch for cars pulling out of driveways.
- Wear costumes that are bright, reflective and flame retardant. Use reflective tape on costumes.
- Avoid masks and hats that could slide over children's eyes. Avoid wearing long, baggy, or loose costumes or oversized shoes to prevent tripping.
- Know the routes your children are taking if you are not going with them. Make sure you set a time that they should be home by and how important it is for them to be home on time.
- Stay away from animals. Even your own pet may not recognize you and become frightened.

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
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
