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

Special Assessment Feedback

Raintree is currently going through the budgeting process where we determine how the funds for next year will be allocated. As always, there are so many things in need of maintenance and repair that there will be few funds left for new improvements. There are a number of projects that the residents have requested, and once again, little progress will be made toward them. For this reason, the board is doing some preliminary investigation into preparing an improvement package to be paid for in a special assessment.

A special assessment is a temporary increase in dues (that must be approved by a majority of the residents) to fund capital improvements. A special assessment would be in the form of a package that would include the projects to be implemented along with a fixed special assessment amount that would be collected (along with the dues) over a 3 year period. For example, there would be projects listed such as; walking trails at a specific location, a splash park on the south side, a gazebo, and parking at the dam. Then the special assessment for this package of projects would be at some fixed amount (example \$15) per month over the next 3 years. The projects and the amount would be submitted to a vote by the residents for approval. According to our bylaws, no special assessment can be made without approval from the residents.

Background information

The current dues at Raintree Lake are well below other similar developments in the area. Here is a comparison of the dues at Raintree Lake vs. similar developments for single-family homes.

Subdivision Annual Dues for 2016

Lakewood \$1,320.00 Winnebago \$1,130.00 Raintree \$508.80

There have been two special assessments in the history of Raintree Lake. The first one was for rip-rap around the shore of the entire lake back in the 1980's. This was needed to save the lake shore which was having serious erosion problems. That was a one-time \$90 assessment. The community was much smaller then. The second assessment was made to add the pool we currently have. That kind of expense would not be possible under the existing budget without incurring a large amount of debt and sacrificing maintenance of existing facilities.

Going Forward

The board will only pursue this if there is enough interest in the community to support it. The process of putting a proposed special assessment together and getting it on a ballot is huge and would take almost a year to complete. The board will be asking for input on projects and the size of the assessment. As you see surveys come out and requests for resident input is requested, please participate. Because of the time and effort required to put together a large package like this, the first thing we would like is feedback on the general level of support for this type of project.

2017 Dues Increase Notice

Re: 2017 Dues Increase Notice Dear Raintree Lake Property Owner,

The following action was taken at the November 9, 2016, Board of Directors meeting:

Using rates from the consumer price index for all urban consumers from July of the preceding year to July of the current year the CPI increase would be 0.84%. The Board of Directors voted to increase the yearly assessment around .00835 in 2017.

Current assessment for single family is \$508.80; the new amount will be \$513.00. This is an increase of \$4.20 per year.

Current assessment for Class B residents in Cobblestone, Windsong and Raintree Lake "attached" Villas is \$339.12; the new amount will be \$341.40. This is an increase of \$2.28 per year.

Current assessment for commercial property is \$452.28; the new amount will be \$456.00. This is an increase of \$3.72 per year.

For additional explanation regarding the rates increase, see page 9 of this publication.

We will continue billing every quarter. The next invoice will be mailed to you the first of January 2017.

December Gardening Tips

- Holiday poinsettia plants do best with sun for at least half the day and with night temperatures in the 50's or 60's. Keep plants away from drafts, registers and radiators. Let the soil dry only slightly between thorough waterings.
- Hairspray works well to keep seed heads and dried flowers intact on wreaths and floral arrangements.
- Water houseplants with tepid water. Cold tap water may shock plants.
- On cold nights, move houseplants back form icy windows to prevent chilling injury.
- Be sure newly purchased indoor plants are well protected for the trip home. Exposure to cold and icy temperatures for even a few moments may cause injury.

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS FUN FACTS!!

Powering a Holiday Tradition—The 87th Annual KCP&L Plaza Lights are ready to shine once again.

In 1925, a Nichols Company employee named Charles Pitrat hung up a string of 16 colored lights to celebrate the season. Today, the KCP&L Plaza Lights has grown into a spectacular three-month-long event that captivates visitors from the world over. Every evening from Thanksgiving through Sunday, Jan. 15, 2017, the lights will shine from 5 p.m. to 3 a.m.—lighting the way for each and every visitor to the Plaza.

Thomas Edison and Edward Johnson

During the 1880 Christmas season, Thomas Edison introduced the first outdoor electric Christmas light display to the world. He displayed the lights outside of his laboratory compound, which sat near a railway where many people could see it each night. This was the first official outdoor Christmas display that was separate from decorating just the Christmas tree. Edward Johnson, who was an inventor under the supervision of Thomas Edison, created the first string of Christmas lights a couple of years later. The string of lights was made out of 80 small electric light bulbs. In 1890, the strings of lights were mass-produced and department stores began displaying them in Christmas displays in their stores. Public displays of Christmas lights in retail stores and government buildings became more popular in the U.S. at the turn of the 20th century and gave way to outdoor displays on homes a few decades later when the electric lights became more affordable.

Dangerous and Expensive

As the trend took off, it became apparent that lighting up the Christmas tree and house definitely took effort and money. For many people, the only Christmas light display option was to light up the tree with candles, because they could not afford to buy lights. The trees would be displayed for only a couple of days before Christmas, and the candles were only lit for a few minutes at night, a far cry from the elaborate tree and home displays we are familiar with today. People were aware of the fire dangers and kept buckets of water and sand nearby in case the tree caught fire. The lit tree was often placed in front of a window for people outside the house to see.

In 1895, the first White House electrically lit Christmas tree was sponsored by President Grover Cleveland, which brought national attention to the trend. At the time, only wealthy people could afford the cost, which was upward of \$300 per season (which would amount to more than \$2,000 in 2010).

Oak Leaf Gall Mites

Oak leaf gall mites are microscopic insect-like creatures that feed on insects found on oak tree leaves. While oak itch mite bites do not pose a major health threat to humans, they can cause redness, bumps and serious itching.

This year may have been a banner year for oak mite-related bites in the Kansas City area. Typically the first freeze in Kansas City is in late October. With mild fall temperatures this year, the mites were able to stick around a bit longer than usual, since it usually takes one or two good freezes to get rid of them.

The itch mites are associated with galls found on the leaves of oak trees - mainly pin oaks and red oaks. The mites feed on larvae inside the gall. In the fall, the mites leave the gall and fall from the leaves. The mites land on anyone passing by. Because they are so small and can be blown by the wind, they can get inside homes through window screens.

The microscopic mites are an annoyance because their bite leaves behind an itchy red, rashy welt that sometimes has fluid-filled centers. Most people don't know they have been bitten by the mites until hours later.

Because the mites are windblown, there's little you can do to prevent them from landing on you. You could try insect repellants that contain DEET, but a better option is to cover up as much of your skin as possible by wearing hats, long-sleeved shirts, long pants and gloves. Once you're back inside, if you think you've been exposed to the mite, remove your clothes and take a shower.


ANGLER AWARDS




3rd Place went to our Tournament Director, **Touny Nhotharack** and was presented his plaque by RAC President, Jenny Besgrove.



A Christmas Story: The Gold and Ivory Tablecloth

At Christmastime, men and women everywhere gather in their churches to wonder anew at the greatest miracle the world has ever known. But another story I like to recall was not a miracle—not exactly.

It happened to a pastor who was very young. His church was very old. Once, long ago, it had flourished. Famous men had preached from its pulpit, prayed before its altar. Rich and poor alike had worshiped there and built it beautifully. Now the good days had passed from the section of town where it stood. But the pastor and his young wife believed in their run-down church. They felt that with paint, hammer, and faith, they could get it in shape. Together they went to work. But late in December, a severe storm whipped through the river valley, and the worst blow fell on the little church—a huge chunk of rain-soaked plaster fell out of the inside wall just behind the altar. Sorrowfully the pastor and his wife swept away the mess, but they couldn't hide the ragged hole. The pastor looked at it and had to remind himself quickly, "Thy will be done!" But his wife wept, "Christmas is only two days away!"

That afternoon the dispirited couple attended an auction held for the benefit of a youth group. The auctioneer opened a box and shook out of its folds a handsome gold-and-ivory lace tablecloth. It was a magnificent item, nearly 15 feet long. But it, too, dated from a long-vanished era. Who, today, had any use for such a thing? There were a few halfhearted bids. Then the pastor was seized with what he thought was a great idea. He bid it in for six dollars and fifty cents. He carried the cloth back to the church and tacked it up on the wall behind the altar. It completely hid the hole! And the extraordinary beauty of its shimmering handwork cast a fine, holiday glow over the chancel. It was a great triumph. Happily he went back to preparing his Christmas sermon.

Just before noon on the day of Christmas Eve, as the pastor was opening the church, he noticed a woman standing in the cold at the bus stop. "The bus won't be here for 40 minutes!" he called, and he invited her into the church to get warm. She told him that she had come from the city that morning to be interviewed for a job as governess to the children of one of the wealthy families in town but she had been turned down. A war refugee, she had imperfect English. The woman sat down in a pew and chafed her hands and rested. After a while, she dropped her head and prayed. She looked up as the pastor began to adjust the great gold-and-ivory lace cloth across the hole. She rose suddenly and walked up the steps of the chancel. She looked at the tablecloth. The pastor smiled and started to tell her about the storm damage, but she didn't seem to listen. She took up a fold of the cloth and rubbed it between her fingers.

"It is mine!" she said. "It is my banquet cloth!" She lifted up a corner and showed the surprised pastor that there were initials monogrammed on it. "My husband had the cloth made especially for me in Brussels! There could not be another like it!" For the next few minutes, the woman and the pastor talked excitedly together. She explained that she was Viennese, that she and her husband had opposed the Nazis and decided to leave the country. They were advised to go separately. Her husband put her on a train for Switzerland. They planned that he would join her as soon as he could arrange to ship their household goods across the border.

She never saw him again. Later she heard that he had died in a concentration camp. "I have always felt that it was my fault—to leave without him," she said. "Perhaps these years of wandering have been my punishment!" The pastor tried to comfort her, urged her to take the cloth with her. She refused. Then she went away.

As the church began to fill on Christmas Eve, it was clear that the cloth was going to be a great success. It had been skillfully designed to look its best by candlelight. After the service, the pastor stood at the doorway; many people told him that the church looked beautiful. One gentle-faced, middle-aged man—he was the local clock-and-watch repairman—looked rather puzzled. "It is strange," he said in his soft accent. "Many years ago, my wife—God rest her—and I owned such a cloth. In our home in Vienna, my wife put it on the table"—and here he smiled—"only when the bishop came to dinner!"

The pastor suddenly became very excited. He told the jeweler about the woman who had been in church earlier in the day. The startled jeweler clutched the pastor's arm. "Can it be? Does she live?" Together the two got in touch with the family who had interviewed her. Then, in the pastor's car, they started for the city. And as Christmas Day was born, this man and his wife—who had been separated through so many saddened Yuletides—were reunited.

To all who heard this story, the joyful purpose of the storm that had knocked a hole in the wall of the church was now quite clear. Of course, people said it was a miracle, but I think you will agree it was the season for it!
