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Fall Maintenance

Before you start fall maintenance projects on your home, remember that exterior changes may need approval from the Architectural Review Board (ARB) - a volunteer board appointed from the neighborhood.

To accommodate residents' needs, the ARB meets the first and third Monday of each month. Applications to be considered need to be turned into the office the Thursday prior to the meeting. <u>Please plan ahead</u> when planning a project and get your approval early because you then are allowed 6 months to complete the project.

Here are some of the items that have to be approved: Roof Replacement, Exterior Paint (repainting existing color or new color choice), Fences, Pools, Decks/Patios, Retaining Walls, Play Equipment and Driveways. This is to name a few. *Failure to receive prior approval will result in a \$200 fine.* ARB applications are available online at <u>www.rlpoa.com</u> or at the office. Preparedness Starts With You:

When disaster strikes, you may not have much time to respond. A spill of hazardous material could mean immediate evacuation. A winter storm could confine your family at home. An earthquake, tornado or any other disaster could cut off basic services - gas, water, electricity and telephone (cell service) for days. After a disaster, local officials and relief workers will not be able to reach everyone immediately. Help could come in hours, or it may take days. Will your family be ready? You'll cope best by preparing for disaster before it strikes.

Create a Disaster Supply Kit:

Keep supplies in an air-tight, easy-to-carry container, such as a covered trash can, backpack or a duffle bag. Rotate your stored food and water supply every six months so it stays fresh. Re-think your family needs and refresh your kit at least once a year, replacing batteries and updating clothing and other supplies.

A supply kit starts with the following:

Water - Store one gallon of water per person per day. Keep at least a three day supply of water.
Food - Store at least a three day supply of non-perishable foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking
First aid kit
Tools and supplies
Clothing and bedding
Specialty items
Important family documents

Playing it Safe on Halloween

Motorists:

- Enter and exit driveways carefully—pay extra attention for children in dark clothing.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs and for those running out from between parked cars.
- If going to a Halloween party, make sure that you do not drink and drive! Use a designated driver if alcohol is being consumed. Alcohol, even in small amounts, slows reaction time and dulls the senses. ***Slow down and stay alert***

Homeowners:

- Do not let anyone into your home that you do not know.
- Keep walkways, driveways, sidewalks, and yard clear of obstacles that can cause a person to fall.
- Do not light candles around walkways. If you would like luminaries or to light a jack-o-lantern, use a battery operated light source or glow stick.
- Homeowners should leave the porch light on so that children will know it is all right to trick-or-treat at your home.
- Confine, segregate or otherwise prepare household pets for an evening of frightful sights and sounds. Be sure that all pets are wearing collars and proper identification tags. Restrain pets so they do not inadvertently jump or bite trick-or-treaters.
- Report any suspicious or criminal activity to the police, Dial "911" for emergencies and 969-7390 for non-emergencies. The police may be very busy, so do not expect them to respond in five minutes.

Tips for a safe Halloween:

- Go only to well-lit homes and remain on porches rather than entering homes.
- Travel in small groups and be accompanied by an adult.
- Bring treats home before eating them so parents can inspect them.
- Use flashlights with fresh batteries or glow sticks.
- Cross streets at corner and do not walk between parked cars. Watch for cars pulling out of driveways.
- Wear costumes that are bright, reflective and flame retardant. Use reflective tape on costumes.
- Know the routes your children are taking if you are not going with them.
- Stay away from animals. Even your own pet may not recognize you and become frightened.

MDC CONFIRMS ZEBRA MUSSELS IN THREE JACKSON COUNTY LAKES

Kansas City, Mo. – The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) has confirmed that zebra mussels are now in the chain lakes of **Prairie Lee, Lake Jacomo and Blue Springs Lake**. Zebra mussels are a prolific invasive species that can harm boats, docks, and the aquatic ecology that supports sport fish. Boaters and anglers are asked to take steps to prevent them from spreading to other lakes.



Adult zebra mussels were first found in Prairie Lee Lake. On July 18 and 19, MDC biologists checked the lakes downstream in the watershed and found juvenile and sub-juvenile zebra mussels in Lake Jacomo and Blue Springs Lake. Zebra mussel densities in all the lakes are low at this point and visitors may not notice them being present, said Jake Allman, MDC fisheries biologist. Recreation at the lakes is not affected at this time, boaters, anglers and swimmers may still enjoy the Jackson County lakes without problem. However, many other community lakes in the Kansas City metro area and reservoirs throughout the state do not yet have zebra mussels. Boaters and anglers can help prevent their spread to new waters.

Boaters who leave their boats on a lake with the mussels for more than a couple days should run the boat frequently. Small juvenile mussels are quite soft and are scoured off the hull at high speeds. On boats which remain in the water, zebra mussels can attach to drive units, cover or enter water intakes, and clog, overheat and destroy the engine. If possible, leave outboards or outdrives in the up position. Periodically inspect hulls and drive units, and scrape free of mussels. Pump hot water through your engine's intake on a regular basis to prevent mussel growth inside the engine's cooling system.

Zebra mussels can alter a lake's ecosystem and harm fisheries. The mussels are filter feeders and will filter large quantities of water, which removes the microscopic plants and animals that most young fish need as their first foods. They can also smother native mussel beds and even attach to crayfish in large numbers. Female zebra mussels can produce as many as one million eggs per year. These develop into microscopic free-swimming larvae called veligers that can float in current into new waters, such as downstream lakes. Veligers quickly begin to form shells. At about three weeks, the sand-grain-sized larvae start to settle. By using adhesive filaments called byssal threads, they attach to any firm surface. Zebra mussels clump together as they grow and cover rock, metal, rubber, wood, docks, boat hulls, native mussels, crayfish, and even aquatic plants.

PREVENT ZEBRA MUSSELS!



Please do not take your boat and trailer to ANY OTHER body of water and then bring it back to Raintree Lake without following the Zebra Mussel prevention regulations. Cleaning requires a power wash, including the trailer with heated water and a quarantine/drying period. Washing alone is not sufficient due to the residual water left in live wells, the bilge, ballast tanks, and other compartments. The only safe procedure is to have your watercraft sit out for the appropriate time

to dry. The quarantine time for the months of June through September is 7 days.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) advises that 104° F water, typical of a normal car wash, is adequate to kill Zebra Mussels with a 20 minute exposure of the hot water, and 140° F is adequate to kill Zebra Mussels with a 10 second exposure. The Greenwood Car Wash at 1103 W. Main St. (next to Casey's) has a bay that has been retrofitted to produce 140° F water at the wash nozzle - the east bay (the bay closest to Casey's.) This Boat Wash bay is currently the only known 140° F power wash station available in our area for residents to use for watercraft washing. Please take the potential threat of zebra mussels seriously. If you have any questions, please contact the Raintree Office at 537-7576.

Spread the Message - Not the Mussel!! Once a lake has them, there is no going back!! Take precautions by closing the gate at the boat ramp behind you!!

Chocolate covered pretzel pumpkins

YIELD: 24 PUMPKIN PRETZELS PREP TIME: 5 MINUTES TOTAL TIME: 10 MINUTES

Ingredients:

1 cup HERSHEY'S Premier White Baking Pieces

3 cups mini pretzels

HERSHEY'S Semi-Sweet Baking Pieces

orange and green food coloring

orange sprinkles, optional

Supplies: wax paper, fork and tooth pick

Directions:

Line wax paper on the counter and gather the rest of your ingredients.



Place the white chocolate chips in a medium size bowl. Then place in the microwave for 1 minute at 50% power. Stir and then cook in 15 second increments until the chocolate is melted. It should be smooth and creamy. Place 2 Tablespoons of the melted chocolate in a small bowl and add the green food coloring. Then mix the orange food coloring into the medium size bowl.

Dip the pretzels into the chocolate and then use a fork to lift the pretzel out. Tap the fork on the edge of the bowl to release any extra chocolate. Place pretzel onto the wax paper and use a toothpick to help slide off the fork.

Add the chocolate chip to the top of the pretzel for the stem and top with sprinkles if desired. Then dip a toothpick into the green frosting and add a little line at the top for the vine.

Allow to harden. Store in a covered container.
