City of Lee's Summit Tree Ordinance



If you have a tree that blocks a sidewalk, walkway, driveway, street, etc, you could receive a "Notice of Violation" letter from the City of Lee's Summit, saying that you are in violation of the following ordinance:

Sec. 16-313.21. Nuisance. Private sidewalks, walkways, stairs, driveways, parking spaces, streets and similar areas not kept in a proper state of repair, and maintained free from hazardous conditions; stairs not complying with the requirement of Section 303.10. (Lee's Summit Code of Ordinances)

City of Lee's Summit Public Works states: "The required height of limbs on the street side of the tree is fourteen feet and the required height of the limbs on the sidewalk side of the tree is eight feet."

If an inspection is required that indicates that there are tree limbs which are causing sight issues for stop signs, speed limit signs and other types of traffic signs or are hitting school buses, refuse trucks, snow plow trucks or street sweepers or causing obstructions for pedestrians, you could be liable to the City for all costs and damages. (Code 1988, 26-2; Ord. No. 5339, 1, 6-20-02)

Please keep the trees and bushes on your property maintained correctly to be a good neighbor and in order to comply with the City codes.

We hear you!



With the recent survey concluded and direction given to the Special Assessment Committee, we are going to attempt to answer many of the comments we received. We will compile information and answer as many as we can, in the next few publications of the **Shoreline**.

Provide some permanent shade at the pool? This was requested numerous times throughout the survey and other venues. The Pool Committee has been tasked by the Board of Directors to look back into options for permanent shade.

Build a second pool. Although this is an easy comment to make, there is an incredible amount of cost that goes into building a pool for use 3 months out of a year. You would be looking at a special assessment in the range of 1.2 to 4.0 million dollars just to construct the pool, dependent on design options. Operationally it would take an additional \$100,000 annually out of the budget to maintain. Size of the pool dictates whether life guards are required, but someone has to be responsible for the start-up, chemical balance, cleanliness and winterization of the pool itself. This is always an option, but one that all residents have to buy into.

Adult pool where adults can actually swim more than just 15 minutes every hour. First we have to address what this 15 minutes is for. It is not about "adult swim time", but for safety reasons. It is actually a safety break! Clearing the pool allows the children to hydrate, rest, bathroom breaks and gives the lifeguards a chance to do the same. Safety begins with the lifeguards maintaining concentration of all the chaos (fun) the pool offers. This is why they rotate positions. Allowing the adults to swim with only the manager on guard, is just a side benefit. Secondly every Thursday evening from 8pm to 10pm is a dedicated night for adults to swim.

I'm paying \$520 a year now for what? Maintaining the association's capital assets is the number one item the Board of Directors is tasked with. Looking at our beautiful community as a whole, we have over 350 acres of common area that includes walking trails, 10 ponds, monument entrances, 2 playgrounds and swimming pool. We have 2 buildings for resident use and a 235 acre recreational lake with boat, swim, courtesy docks and a rental pontoon. Compare this to what you have to do with maintaining your home and yard, and the assessments are a bargain.

We would be unable to use any of the projects listed. Waste of money for us. We understand that it is someone's choice whether they utilize the amenities this community has to offer, but choices were made at the time someone purchased a home here. As our life styles change over time, we all agree that our homes are a valuable asset to us personally and preserving property values is what we all should agree to.

- Cannas and dahlias can be dug when frost nips their foliage. Allow the plants to dry under cover in an airy, frost-free place before storage.
- Grass seeding should be finished by October 15.
- Winterize lawn mowers before storage.

Playing it Safe on Halloween

Motorists:

- Enter and exit driveways carefully—pay extra attention for children in dark clothing.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs and for those running out from between parked cars.
- If going to a Halloween party, make sure that you do not drink and drive! Use a designated driver if alcohol is being consumed. Alcohol, even in small amounts, slows reaction time and dulls the senses.
 Slow down and stay alert

Homeowners:

- Do not let anyone into your home that you do not know.
- Keep walkways, driveways, sidewalks, and yard clear of obstacles that can cause a person to fall.
- Do not light candles around walkways. If you would like luminaries or to light a jack-o-lantern, use a battery operated light source or glow stick.
- Homeowners should leave the porch light on so that children will know it is all right to trick-or-treat at your home.
- Confine, segregate or otherwise prepare household pets for an evening of frightful sights and sounds. Be sure that all pets are wearing collars and proper identification tags. Restrain pets so they do not inadvertently jump or bite trick-or-treaters.
- Report any suspicious or criminal activity to the police, Dial "911" for emergencies and 969-7390 for non-emergencies. The police may be very busy, so do not expect them to respond in five minutes.

Tips for a safe Halloween:

- Go only to well-lit homes and remain on porches rather than entering homes.
- Travel in small groups and be accompanied by an adult.
- Bring treats home before eating them so parents can inspect them.
- Use flashlights with fresh batteries or glow sticks.
- Cross streets at corner and do not walk between parked cars. Watch for cars pulling out of driveways.
- Wear costumes that are bright, reflective and flame retardant. Use reflective tape on costumes.
- Know the routes your children are taking if you are not going with them.
- Stay away from animals. Even your own pet may not recognize you and become frightened.

Be wary of deer on the roadway:

Autumn roads in the Midwest can be beautiful, but in addition to fall foliage, motorists should be on the lookout for deer because they are most active from October through December. The insurance Institute for Highway Safety estimates there are more than 1.5 million deer-vehicle collisions each year, resulting in 150 occupant deaths, thousands of injuries, and more than \$1 billion in vehicle damage. To reduce your chance of animal collisions, heed these tips:

Pay attention and reduce your speed when you see deer-crossing signs.

If you see one deer, look out for more as they often travel in herds.

Be extra cautious during dawn and dusk hours when animals tend to be more active. Stay alert and watch your speed.

At night, use high beams when no traffic is approaching to spot wildlife.

If a deer runs in front of your car, do not swerve because it can cause an even more serious accident.

Home Improvements may Need Approval!!!!



Before you start maintenance on your homes this fall, remember that exterior changes may need approval from the Architectural Review Board (ARB).

To accommodate residents' needs, the ARB (made up of resident volunteers) meets the first and third Monday of each

month. Applications to be considered need to be turned into the office the Thursday prior to the meeting. Please plan ahead when planning a project and get your approval early because you then are allowed 6 months to begin the project.

Here are some of the items that have to be approved: Roof Replacement, Exterior Paint (repainting existing color or new color choice), Fences, Pools, Decks/Patios, Retaining Walls,

Play Equipment, and Driveways. This is to name a few. Failure to receive prior approval will result in a \$200 fine.

Some Home Improvements may Need City Approval

Here's a list of projects that require City Permits:

- Room additions
- Decks
- Covered decks
- Basement finishes
- In-ground lawn sprinkler systems
- Fences more than six feet in height
- Roofing
- Swimming pools, both above ground and in-ground
- Furnace and air conditioner replacement

Before beginning your next home improvement project, check with Lee's Summit Development Services at 816-969-1200 to determine if your project requires a City Permit (in addition to Raintree approval) before the work begins.

Funds Available for Minor Home Repairs in Lee's Summit

The City of Lee's Summit is helping low- and moderate-income residents fix up their homes. The City is accepting applications Aug. 13 through Oct. 5 for its Minor Home Repair Program, which awards up to \$10,000 to qualified residents for certain home repairs and up to \$3,000 for private sanitary sewer improvements.

The City has reserved \$146,000 in funding through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant. Eligible repairs are limited to the exterior of the home and include windows, doors, roof, paint, porches and steps, guttering, flashing and exterior foundation walls.

Some requirements for eligibility include:

- The homes must be owner-occupied, detached single -family structures.
- The homes must reside within the corporate city limits of Lee's Summit.
- 3. The homeowner must contribute a share of the repair costs of no less than \$20 and no more than \$500.
- A three-year lien will be placed on the property by the City.

"It's been a major blessing. We've been very thankful for the program. I wish more people were aware of it so they could take advantage. It's helped us keep the house in good shape and has made a big difference," said Kay Taylor, a recipient of the program.
