

# Lake Reminders During Storm Season

Boaters—During stormy weather, be sure to check on your boat to make sure your cover is secure, your bilge is working, etc.

Also both boaters and swimmers need to be aware of debris floating in the lake that could become a hazard.

Be aware that after a storm event, the lake e-coli levels will be high—so swim at your own risk.

Remember, if you see lightning or hear thunder, head home! Don't be the highest point on the lake in a storm!

## Why Would a Raintree Water Patrol Officer Ask for My Raintree I.D.?



The Raintree Water Patrol is tasked with keeping those in and around the lake safe. One of their jobs is to ask those they see if they are residents of Raintree. So, while you are out fishing or swimming in the lake, etc., a member of the Raintree Water Patrol might stop and ask if you are a resident of Raintree and if you have your Raintree I.D. with you. Please do not be offended or defensive if this is asked of you. Raintree residents have the right to enjoy the lake and other amenities, but since this is private property, others who are non-residents, do not have that same right and will be asked to leave, unless they are guests of a Raintree resident. <u>Residents need only show their I.D. card and continue enjoying the lake.</u>

Don't have a Raintree I.D. card? Stop by the office and get one-the first one is free. Replacements cost \$5.00.

# Current Pool Instructions

The Jackson County Health Department may be making changes to the pool restrictions in the coming days. The only way to get the full and correct information, as soon as it is known, is to **sign up for the Raintree e-News at www.rlpoa.com**.

## HERE'S SOME HELPFUL INFO FOR YOU TO KEEP IN MIND:

Dues must be current (balance less than \$136.26) and Resident ID cards are required for all family members, 3 years and older. Guests are not allowed at this time, however, grandparents that are residents can bring in their grandchildren.

All 6' social distancing rules will apply with the exception of chairs (families can pull them together.) Social distancing is a MUST and parents/grandparents HAVE to be the responsible party for keeping children <u>social distancing in the pool and on the deck</u>. Lifeguards are only there to save life, not enforce distancing rules.

Safety break every hour still applies. This is for the staff to hydrate and rotate positions keeping them alert and you safe. There will be no temperature checks coming in—we are really putting that burden on the parents to know if a child (or themselves) should be at the pool. Please do not bring anyone that has been sick until 48 hours after they feel better. Obviously Covid-19 exposure is to quarantine for 14 days.

Maximum occupancy remains at 125 people.

You can sign up, for a 2-hour block of time, individually or as a family from the Raintree website (www.rlpoa.com). We will no longer limit it to two times per week. Walk-ins are not available—we do not want lines forming unless you have registered. Remember, 6' is required. We are also giving staff 30 minutes between blocks to sanitize chairs, handrails and bathrooms.

You must reserve for the correct number of people. For example, if four people of your family are coming to the pool, make the reservation for 4. If you list it as 1, then only 1 person will be allowed in the pool. If children are old enough to be at the pool by themselves, they can sign up individually.

You can go back in and review / edit / delete your reservation if necessary.


Adult swim is a reserved time block and is considered one of your four available blocks.

Babysitter passes can still be purchased. You would need to visit the office to fill out the paperwork.

The drinking fountain will not be connected, so please bring a container to fill if you want water from the bathroom. Concession will also be open, but will not be available to fill bottles due to sanitation concerns.

We are currently not booking for parties at the pool. Again, guests are not allowed and will be turned away. If all are residents that will be attending, then each family can reserve that time separately.

Residents are no longer allowed to eat at the pools edge.





# 8 Quiet Signs of Someone Drowning

Find out the real warning signs that someone is in trouble in the water

Drowning is the second-most common cause of accidental death in children ages 1 to 14 (just behind motor vehicle accidents). In a 2004 study by a national safety group, 90 percent of children who drowned did so while under the care of an adult or a teenager. In many cases, the study suggests, that person had a momentary lapse of attention. But the fact is that often those watching don't know what to look for—because drowning doesn't look like drowning. To ward off a tragedy in the making, watch for the 8 signs that someone is in trouble.

1. A drowning person can't call for help—she has to be able to breathe before she can speak. When a person is drowning, her mouth sinks below and reappears above the surface of the water. There isn't time for her to exhale, inhale, and call out.

2. She can't wave for help either. A drowning person instinctively extends her arms to the sides and presses down to lift her mouth out of the water; a child may extend her arms forward. She can't use her arms to move toward a rescuer or reach for rescue equipment.

3. A drowning person remains upright in the water, with no evidence of kicking. She can struggle for only 20 to 60 seconds before going under.

- 4. Eyes are glassy, unable to focus, or closed.
- 5. Hair may be over forehead or eyes.

6. Head is low in the water, with mouth at water level; head may be tilted back with mouth open. A child's head may fall forward.

7. Sometimes the most important indicator that someone is drowning is that she doesn't look like she's drowning. She may just seem to be looking up at the sky, shore, pool deck, or dock. Ask her, "Are you all right?" If she can answer at all, she probably is okay. If she returns a blank stare, you may have less than 30 seconds to get to her.

8. Children playing in the water make noise. When they get quiet, you need to get to them and find out why.

## Leaving Gate Open at Boat Ramp is a Violation!!

#### VII. MISCELLANEOUS OPERATING RULES:

22.Boat Ramp Gate: Each resident must close and lock gate after each use to load or unload a boat onto Raintree Lake, provided there is not another resident with current sticker waiting to use the ramp. Failure to close and lock the boat ramp gate is a violation.

# PREVENT ZEBRA MUSSELS!



Please do not take your boat and trailer to ANY OTHER body of water and then bring it back to Raintree Lake without following the Zebra Mussel prevention regulations. Cleaning requires a power wash, including the trailer with heated water and a quarantine/drying period. Washing alone is not sufficient due to the residual water left in live wells, the bilge, ballast tanks, and other compartments. The only safe procedure is to have your watercraft sit out for the appropriate time to dry. The guarantine for the months of June through September is 7 days.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) advises that 104° F water, typical of a normal car wash, is adequate to kill Zebra Mussels with a 20 minute exposure of the hot water, and 140° F is adequate to kill Zebra Mussels with a 10 second exposure. The Greenwood Car Wash at 1103 W. Main St. (next to Casey's) has a bay that has been retrofitted to produce 140° F water at the wash nozzle - the east bay (the bay closest to Casey's.) This Boat Wash bay is currently the only known 140° F power wash station available in our area for residents to use for watercraft washing. Please take the potential threat of zebra mussels seriously. If you have any questions, please contact the Raintree Office at 537-7576.


Regarding illegal dumping behind the commercial properties at the corner of Ward and 150 Hwy:

## Coyotes—Living With Wildlife



It's a nice Saturday morning so you decide to drink your coffee on the back porch. Upon opening the door, you see a dark shadow at the corner of the property line. The neighbor's dog got out again, you assume. As you start your trek to return Rufus to his owner, the shadow moves into the light. You realize it's not Rufus. It's a coyote! You holler at the coyote and scare it away. But what if it comes back? Every day, Missourians encounter wildlife in one way or another. You might feed songbirds and happily watch them through your kitchen window. Or see a squirrel scampering through your front yard, looking for a good place to stash his latest acorn. Seeing these common species don't usually cause concern, but what if you should see something bigger, like a coyote?

Wildlife, especially in urban areas, have lost their fear of humans. But this isn't necessarily cause for concern. If you think about the situation from the wildlife's view, they have no negative interactions with humans. They have human food readily available to feast on, they aren't being shot at, and they see you every day. Just like you're not concerned when you see your neighbor pull into their driveway, urban wildlife has accepted you as part of their environment. You are a given to them. Even if it seems inevitable that some of our wildlife will lose their fear of humans, there are still steps you can take to help. Look around your house and property for food sources. Coyotes are attracted to neighborhoods where there is a higher density of prey resources because people feed birds, squirrels, raccoons, and deer. This human feeding concentrates all these animals, making them easy prey for the coyotes. They will also eat garbage. They are surprisingly intelligent and resourceful animals. Also, think about fencing off areas, like gardens, to help deter wildlife.

If you see a coyote, scare it. Do what you can to give it a negative interaction with humans. This could include banging pots and pans, yelling or making other loud, threatening noises, spraying high pressure garden hoses, or blowing air horns. Shaker cans filled with pennies can also be effective. If its encounter with humans is unpleasant, a coyote will be less likely to come back. The key is consistency, being visible, and making sure coyotes know that humans are the source of unpleasantness.

One concern regarding coyotes is pets. Housecats and small dogs seem more like natural prey such as rabbits and squirrels. Pet owners must be especially vigilant in areas where coyotes live. "The days of yesterday where you could just send your pet out the door and let it do its business for an hour is no longer," said Joe DeBold, the urban wildlife biologist for the Missouri Department of Conservation, Kansas City region. "You go out there and be there with your cat or dog every time it goes outside, be right beside it. And that will most generally take away the threat. Because when coyotes attack a cat or dog, it's usually not right at the feet of a human."

Fortunately, coyotes pose little threat to people. A 2009 study of coyote attacks on humans in the U.S. and Canada uncovered fewer than 150 such occurrences between 1960–2006.

It is possible for people and coyotes to successfully coexist. Coyotes are even helpful in that they keep wildlife populations in check, act as scavengers and remove dead animals, help control rodent populations, and even eat rabbits, which might be eating your garden.



# 7 Things You Probably Didn't Know About Fireworks

Fireworks have become a tradition in the U.S. for the Fourth of July. These seven facts about fireworks may surprise you.

Nothing says July—and America's independence—like fireworks. Fireworks have become a tradition in the U.S. on and around the Fourth of July. They've been scaring pets and entertaining humans for centuries with big explosions and bright colors.

## But how did it all begin? We'll explore some fun facts as well as the history of fireworks from around the world.

## 1. China invented fireworks

China is credited with the invention of fireworks. According to <u>fireworks.com</u>, the most common legend talks about a Chinese cook, who mistakenly invented fireworks while mixing charcoal, sulphur, and saltpeter (potassium nitrate). The mixture was compressed in a bamboo tube and eventually exploded. Other accounts say that the Chinese used fireworks to scare away mountain men perceived as threatening.

#### 2. Italy made fireworks pretty

Hats off to the Chinese for the invention, but Italy deserves the credit for making fireworks bright and beautiful. According to <u>Smithsonian.com</u>, Italy is responsible for introducing aerial shells to the firework world, which gives them their shape. The Italians also discovered the use of metallic powders to create desired colors.

#### 3. Fireworks came to America in 1777

Fireworks made their first official appearance on July 4, 1777. This excerpt from the Pennsylvania *Evening Post* described the occasion, "The evening was closed with the ring of bells, and at night there was a grand exhibition of fireworks (which began and concluded with thirteen rockets) on the Commons, and the city was beautifully illuminated." Since that day, fireworks have been an invaluable part of Independence Day celebrations.

#### 4. The average consumer spends . . .

According to the <u>Denver Post</u>, the average American household is expected to spend \$71.23 on fireworks in 2016, adding up to \$710 million in total spend in the land of the free. Bonus fact: It's projected that \$6.7 billion will be spent on food this year for the Fourth of July.

## 5. The world's largest fireworks show was in the Philippines

Dubai shocked the world in 2014 with a magnificent display of fireworks, which at the time set a world record for the largest firework display ever recorded. That record was broken in the Philippines on January 1, 2016 in the pouring rain, when 810,904 fireworks were set off. The show lasted 61 minutes and 32 seconds, according to <u>Guinness World Records</u>.

## 6. Disney is the largest consumer of fireworks in the U.S

Visit any Disney theme park at night, and you'll know exactly why this fact made the list. Disney doesn't just set off fireworks—it takes its visitors on an immersive storytelling experience in which fireworks are an essential part of the magic.

## 7. Blue fireworks are the hardest to make

With all the colors you see in a firework show, blue is indeed the most difficult to make, according to Jim Souza, whose company puts on the Macy's July 4 event. Souza told <u>Parade.com</u>, "It's harder to make blue. It's all about balancing heat and the chemical compositions."

Aside from the history and the fun, fireworks can be extremely dangerous. In fact, firework-related injuries in the U.S. <u>climbed to</u> <u>10,500</u> by 2014, according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC). Fireworks also send approximately <u>230 people</u> <u>to the emergency room</u> every Fourth of July. The most dangerous types of fireworks are perhaps the simplest—firecrackers account for 20 percent of firework-related injuries each year and sparklers account for 19 percent.

Remember that bystanders are also at risk when fireworks are around. Take precautionary measures this summer to ensure your own safety and that of your loved ones. Have a happy, healthy Fourth of July !
