Enforcement will begin on unlicensed and expired tags of vehicles parked in the driveways, per Raintree Rules & Regulations

5. INOPERATIVE shall be defined as having any one (1) or more of the following conditions, which shall be deemed prima facie evidence that a vehicle is inoperable:

A. Junk, wrecked, disabled or damaged beyond repair

- B. Placement of the vehicle or parts thereof upon jacks, blocks, chains or other supports;
- C. Having one (1) or more deflated or missing tires
- D. Absence of one or more parts of the vehicle necessary for the lawful operation of the vehicle upon the streets and highways;
- F. Allowed fines per differing vehicles are as referenced under this procedure.
- 3. ALL OTHER TYPES OF MOTOR AND INOPERABLE VEHICLES if violated as defined in Section E there shall be a fine of \$25 and thereafter each five (5) day period of disregard the fine shall be fifty (\$50) dollars.



Raintree's Top 5 Codes Offenses

- 1.Trash out when not allowed.
- 2.Painting exterior of home without approval.
- 3. Trailer in driveway longer than 72 hours.
- 4.Installation of fence without approval.
- 5.Installation of new roof without approval.

CAN I OPERATE A GOLF CART ON THE CITY STREETS?

City's Unified Development Ordinance: It is illegal to drive a golf cart on streets and sidewalks



Sec. 29.1 Definitions:

Other motorized devices shall mean any gasoline or electric powered device that is not a motor vehicle, motorized bicycle, all-terrain vehicle, electric powered assistive mobility device, or motorized wheelchair or power scooter operated by a person with a disability.

Sec. 29-517 F:

No person shall ride in or on any other motorized devices on any street, highway, sidewalk or on any other public property.

RAINTREE COMMON GROUND REGULATIONS

Driving on Common Ground with cars, motorcycles or off-road vehicles is not allowed. Only limited motorized travel is allowed on Common Ground areas for homeowners with disabilities and/or mowing. Exceptions may be granted by the RLPOA General Manager.

CREATIVE IDEAS FOR CELEBRATING HALLOWEEN!


Needing ideas to celebrate Halloween while keeping socially distant? Read on for inspiration!



INVASIVE SPECIES FOUND IN RAINTREE LAKE



Common Name: Water lettuce

Origin: Africa and South America

Pathways

Water lettuce was introduced to North America as an aquarium and water garden plant. It is often spread by the release of aquarium plants.

THREAT

Water lettuce forms thick mats that block sunlight and slow or prevent the growth of native aquatic plants. As the plant dies and decomposes, it removes oxygen from the water, which can disrupt fish communities. **Dense mats of water lettuce can hinder swimmers and boaters, prevent other recreational uses of waterways**, and restrict water flow in irrigation and flood control canals.

Management

Small and isolated infestations can be easily controlled manually (hand pulling). Larger infestations can be addressed using harvesters, large machines that scoop up plants. Once large infestations have been decreased in size and density using harvesters, hand removal can be used to finish the job. Chemical control is also effective.

Description

Water lettuce is an often free-floating aquatic plant that resembles an open head of lettuce. Feathery roots grow under the plants, which can connect a large number of plants together. Leaves are light green, thick, softly hairy and have parallel veins and scalloped edges.

Don't dump aquarium or water garden plants down a storm drain!

All street storm drains lead to a waterway!

Be Halloween Safe!!

- Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- Go only to well-lit homes and remain on porches rather than entering homes.
- Fasten reflective tape to costumes to help drivers see you.
- Have a parent or trusted adult examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.
- Use a flashlight and always WALK and don't run from house to house.
- Cross streets at corners and do not walk between parked cars. Look both ways before
 crossing the street. Watch for cars pulling out of driveways.
- Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes. Never walk near lit candles or luminaries.
- Stay away from animals. Even a normally friendly animal may be startled by costumes.



First-Time Boat Owner's Off-Season Checklist

One of the biggest surprises of the COVID-19 pandemic has been the number of people rushing to become boaters. From kayaks to pontoons, center consoles and ski boats, dealerships are reporting a buying frenzy. As a result, a lot of new boat owners are just now finishing up their first boating season and starting to ask the same question: What next?

You Just Finished Your First Summer with a Boat. Now What?

If done right, the boating off-season can help to make the next year out on the water even better than the last one. Here's a look at three things you can do to make the most of your boating off-season this year.

Basic Maintenance

The boating off-season is a great time to do the maintenance projects that tend to get put off during fun summer weekends. Not only is the off-season a terrific time to make sure things like oil changes and filter replacements are completed, but it's also a great time to correct problems that popped up out on the water.

- Did a restraining strap break where you stow the water skis?
- Could you use a better tie-down for the cooler you liked to bring out on the boat every weekend?
- Did the kids break one of the steps in your rope ladder while climbing back up and into the boat from a swim?

Big maintenance projects for boats tends to come on a predictable schedule, as with automobiles, but using the off-season to do smaller maintenance projects like these can really enhance your time out on the water next year. Take the time to think about the little things that annoyed you on board, and use the boating off-season to eliminate those issues before hitting the water again next year.

Boat Storage & Winterization

One of the best lessons that new boat owners can learn during their first off-season is how to properly winterize and store the boat. Different boats come with different manufacturer recommendations, but generally speaking, you're going to want to make sure that your engine, tanks and heads are free of water that might cause corrosion or freeze.

- You'll need to drain various lines;
- Add stabilizers as required;
- Ensure that the boat is properly covered to keep moisture out and everything else protected.

Proper storage and winterization will make the start of your next boating season a whole lot easier. If everything is done right during the off-season, then the fun of the next boating season can start a whole lot faster. Everything will be in good working order on Day One, and off you'll go.

Education & Training

How did you feel out on the water during your first season with a boat? Did you feel confident that you knew all the rules of the road? Were you familiar with all of your boat's features? The boating off-season is a great time to invest in some boating education. No matter whether it's taking an online course about basic safety and rules of the road, or reading a "boating bible," additional education will only enhance your time on the water when the next season arrives. It is also helpful to review manuals for everything on board, to learn about features that you may not even realize you already have on your boat.

TEN MUSSELS



ebra mussels are among the most devastating aquatic invasive species to invade North American freshwater. They profoundly disrupt aquatic ecosystems and reduce food sources for native species. **In addition they damage boats by encrusting boat hulls,**

clogging water intake systems used in boat motors, and their sharp shells are a safety hazard to recreationalists.

Zebra mussels continue to be a concern at Raintree. If you take your boat to another body of water, please follow the guidelines for zebra mussel decontamination before you put your boat back in our lake. Boats MUST be washed down with hot water, paying special



attention to live wells and anywhere water may collect. In addition, boats should be kept out of the water for approximately seven days (with temperatures of 80-100 degrees) to completely dry before being re-launched into Raintree lake. Other area lakes that have zebra mussels find them to be incredibly damaging to docks and boats. Please do your part to keep our lake zebra mussel free. Visit www.protectyourwaters.net to get the latest news on zebra mussel prevention.

October Tips and Tasks for Lawn and Garden

Ornamental

- Continue watering, especially evergreens if soils are dry.
- Nuts or seeds of woody plants usually require exposure to 3 months cold before sprouting. This may be provided by outdoor
 planting in fall or "stratifying" in an unsealed bag of damp peat moss placed in the refrigerator.
- Container grown and balled and burlapped trees and shrubs can be planted. Loosen the soil in an area 2 times the diameter of
 the root ball before planting. Mulch well after watering.
- Dig and divide or plant new perennials by October 15 to allow time for the plants to root in well before winter.
- Plant spring bulbs among hostas, ferns, daylilies or ground covers. As these plants grow in the spring they will hide the dying bulb foliage.
- Spring bulbs for forcing can be potted up now and stored in a cool, frost-free place until it is time to bring indoors, usually 12 to 15 weeks.
- Cannas and dahlias can be dug when frost nips their foliage. Allow the plants to dry under cover in an airy, frost-free place before storage.
- Transplant deciduous trees once they have dropped their leaves.
- Plant tulips now.
- Trees may be fertilized now. This is best done following soil test guidelines.

Lawn

- Plant cool-season lawn grasses by October 15. Existing lawn or newly seeded areas that are at least one month old can also be
 fertilized at this time. Seeding should be finished by October 15.
- Broadleaf herbicides can be applied now to control cool-season weeds such as chickweed and dandelion.
- Continue mowing lawns until growth stops.
- Keep leaves raked off lawns to prevent smothering grass.
- Now is a good time to apply lime if soil tests indicate the need.
- Winterize lawn mowers before storage.

Vegetables

- Sow cover crops such as winter rye after crops are harvested.
- Harvest winter squash and pumpkins before frost. For best storage quality, leave an inch or two of stem on each fruit.
- Dig sweet potatoes before a bad freeze.
- Gourds should be harvested when their shells become hard or when their color changes from green to brown.
- A few degrees of frost protection may be gained by covering tender plants with sheets or light-weight fabric row covers.
- Continue harvesting tender crops before frost.
- The average first frost usually arrives about October 15-20.

Fruits

- Store apples in a cool basement in old plastic sacks that have been perforated for good air circulation.
- Persimmons start to ripen, especially after frost.
- Monitor fruit plantings for mouse activity and take steps for their control if present.
- Place wire guards around trunks of young fruit trees for protection against mice and rabbits.
