PREVENT ZEBRA MUSSELS!



Please do not take your boat and trailer to **ANY OTHER** body of water and then bring it back to Raintree Lake without following the Zebra Mussel prevention regulations. Cleaning requires a power wash, including the trailer with heated water and a quarantine/drying period. Washing alone is not sufficient due to the residual water left in live wells, the bilge, ballast tanks, and other compartments. The only safe procedure is to have your watercraft sit out for the appropriate time to dry. The quarantine time for the months of June through September is 7 days.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) advises that 104° F water, typical of a normal car wash, is adequate to kill Zebra Mussels with a 20 minute exposure of the hot water, and 140° F is adequate to kill Zebra Mussels with a 10 second exposure. The Greenwood Car Wash at 1103 W. Main St. (next to Casey's) has a bay that has been retrofitted to produce 140° F water at the wash nozzle - the east bay (the bay closest to Casey's.) This Boat Wash bay is currently the only known 140° F power wash station available in our area for residents to use for watercraft washing. Please take the potential threat of zebra mussels seriously. If you have any questions, please contact the Raintree Office at 537-7576.

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8 Quiet Signs of Someone Drowning

Find out the real warning signs that someone is in trouble in the water from mariovittone.com

Drowning is the second-most common cause of accidental death in children ages 1 to 14 (just behind motor vehicle accidents). In a study by the national safety group, 90% of children who drowned did so while under the care of an adult or teenager. In many cases, the study suggests, that person had a momentary lapse of attention. But the fact is that often those watching don't know what to look for—because drowning doesn't look like drowning. To ward off a tragedy in the making, watch for the 8 signs that someone is in trouble.

- A drowning person can't call for help—she has to be able to breathe before she can speak. When a person is drowning, her mouth sinks below and reappears above the surface of the water. There isn't time for her to exhale, inhale, and callout.
- She can't wave for help either. A drowning person instinctively extends her arms to the sides and presses down to lift her mouth out of the water; a child may extend her arms forward. She can't use her arms to move toward a rescuer or reach for rescue equipment.
- A drowning person remains upright in the water, with no evidence of kicking. She can struggle for only 20 to 60 seconds before going under.
- 4. Eyes are glassy, unable to focus, or closed.
- 5. Hair may be over forehead or eyes.
- Head is low in the water, with mouth at water level; head may be tilted back with mouth open. A child's head may fall forward.
- 7. Sometimes the most important indicator that someone is drowning is that she doesn't look like she's drowning. She may just seem to be looking up at the sky, shore, pool deck, or dock. Ask her, "Are you all right?" If she can answer at all, she probably is. If she returns a blank stare, you may have less than 30 seconds to get to her.
- Children playing in the water make noise. When they get quiet, you need to get to them and find out why.









Home Improvements May Need Approval!!!!

Please remember that exterior changes may need approval from the Architectural Review Board (ARB). To accommodate residents' needs, the ARB meets on Monday's of each month. Applications to be considered need to be turned into the office the Thursday prior to the meeting.

Please plan ahead when planning a project and get your approval early because you then are allowed 6 months to begin the project. ARB applications can be found on our website at www.rlpoa.com under "For Residents" > Forms > Architectural Review Forms. Please select the application required for your project. Some applications do require "plot plans," so contact the office if you do not have one available and we can check to see if we have one on file. ALL APPLICATIONS HAVE TO BE TURNED INTO THE RAINTREE OFFICE—PLEASE DO NOT EMAIL THEM TO THE ARB DIRECTLY.

Here are some of the items that have to be approved: Roof Replacement, Exterior Paint (repainting existing color or new color choice), Fences, Pools, Decks/Patios, Retaining Walls, Play Equipment, and Driveways. This is to name a few.

Failure to receive prior approval will result in a \$200 fine. If you have any questions, contact the office at 816-537-7576.





VII. MISCELLANEOUS OPERATING RULES:

22. Boat Ramp Gate: Each resident must close and lock gate after each use to load or unload a boat onto Raintree Lake, provided there is not another resident with current sticker waiting to use the ramp. Failure to close and lock the boat ramp gate is a violation. Approved 7-10-18

The gate at the boat ramp is intended to serve as a reminder that every boater at Raintree is responsible for the health of our lake.

There are two reasons for the gate: trespassers and invasive species control. Trespassing boaters have been relatively minimal, but they cause a fair amount of concern. A locked gate is expected to send a very clear message to would-be trespassers.

The second reason, invasive species control, is a much more significant challenge that could affect all residents. The invasive species of most concern to the Lake Committee and the Board is zebra mussels. Zebra mussels can cause significant damage to boats and structures in the lake as well as injury to swimmers—all of which has the potential to reduce property values in our community.

Zebra mussels reproduce at incredible rates. A single female zebra mussel can reproduce a million eggs each year. Zebra mussels are not visible to the naked eye in their larvae stage. Zebra mussels have been identified a number of locations in Missouri and Kansas. They have not been found in Raintree Lake at this point.

Current Pool Information

- The pool WILL open with regular operating hours WOO HOO!!!
 No sign ups or time blocks and normal summer pool hours please see page 11.
- Pool guests there will be a limit of 2 guests per lot per day.
- We are putting the burden on parents to know if a child (or themselves) should be at the pool. Please do not bring anyone that has been sick until 48 hours after they feel better.
- Covid-19 exposure is to quarantine for 14 days
- Residents are no longer allowed to eat at the pools edge
- Maximum occupancy is 235 people



Current Swim Dock Information

Swim Docks will remain limited to residents only or lot owner/lessee with up to 2 guests per lot. There will be a maximum limit of 8 people allowed within the dock and swim area. Owner or Lessee **MUST** be present with guests at **ALL** times.



SOME POOL RULE REMINDERS:

Rule #3: No smoking, vaping, alcoholic beverages or drugs of any kind shall be allowed in the pool area.

Rule #16: Appropriate swim attire required. Prohibited attire includes but not limited to string or thong bikinis, jean shorts, basketball shorts, bras, tank tops, swim wear that becomes see through when wet or other attire determined to be inappropriate by Pool and/or RLPOA management.

15-Minute
Swim Break

The last 15 minutes of each hour at the Raintree Pool have been deemed a Swim Break—which is for SAFETY REASONS. This is a time for the pool to be emptied so lifeguards can view a clear pool, take a break from their duties, hydrate and rotate positions. During this time only adults, 18 years and older, may be in the pool, and the pool manager assumes the duties of lifeguard during that time.

Those under 18 years old may sit around the perimeter of the pool only.

Although this may be inconvenient for those at the pool, it is necessary for the safety of all residents and staff.



Babysitter passes, Caregiver passes, and House Sitter Passes are available for \$50.00 in the Raintree Office for the 2021 Pool Season. A Raintree homeowner must come to the office to fill out the necessary paperwork before pass will be granted. The office accepts payment of cash or check.

To replace a LOST card, \$5.00 will get you a new one! The office accepts cash or check only!

To replace a ruined card, bring what is left and you will receive a replacement at no cost to you!



Pool Guest Credit Q & A:

Q:How do I get Guest Credits to use at the pool?

A:Ten Guest Credits are given to each Raintree household each year. Also, up to 10 Guest Credits, that remained unused from the previous year, can be brought forward to this year. So, each household has the possibility of having 20 guest credits for use at the beginning of the season. These credits are loaded electronically in the office and reduced electronically by pool employees when a member of your household brings in guests.

Q:What if I run out of Guest Credits?

A:Additional Guest Credits can be purchased in the Raintree Office (NOT AT THE POOL) for \$2.00 each, in lots of 10. So for \$20.00 you receive 10 Guest Credits. Any Guest Credits that are purchased and not used will be brought forward to the next year.

Remember that you must stay with, and are responsible for, any guest you bring to the pool.

Also, please remember that dues must be up-to-date in order to use the pool.



The Forgotten History Behind Father's Day

In a society built on patriarchy, you would think that the idea of a holiday celebrating men who had become fathers would be wholly accepted. That wasn't the case when Father's Day — specifically in the United States — was proposed, creating what became a hotly contested debate.

Father's Day became a national holiday in the U.S. in 1972, when it was officially recognized by President Richard Nixon's administration, six years after former president Lyndon B. Johnson issued the first Presidential Father's Day Proclamation in 1966, declaring the third Sunday in June a dedicated day to commemorate dads. For nearly 50 years, we have formally celebrated the fathers and father-like figures in our lives, purchasing barbecue-embellished greeting cards and the latest fishing gear without a second thought.

But this mid-20th-century dedication was not reflective of the country's sentiments on fatherhood during the first half of that century. According to Lawrence R. Samuel, the author of <u>American Fatherhood: A Cultural History</u>, the idea of a holiday exalting fatherhood was inconceivable to most people during the early 1900s. "Men dominated American society in the early 20th century, of course, making many conclude that establishing a special day to honor fathers was a rather silly and wholly unnecessary idea," Samuel states. Unlike Mother's Day, which was officially recognized in 1914 and became a nationally accepted as a day to celebrate the underappreciated services of moms around the country, Father's Day had a harder time getting men to accept a day dedicated to them. "Many American men found the idea of a Father's Day too effeminate for their liking, and also believed it was a holiday invented solely for commercial purposes,". According to Samuel, the first-ever Father's Day took place in 1908 in a West Virginia church, after hundreds of men died in the worst mining accident in U.S. history. It was a holiday meant to be etched in thankfulness, and it was Grace Golden Clayton, the daughter of a dedicated reverend, who first proposed a day to honor fathers both alive and dead .The creator of the countrywide celebration of fathers is often considered to be Spokane, Washington, resident Sonora Smart Dodd. Dodd was brought up by her single father, who raised her and her five siblings after their mother died. To honor her father, she wanted to create a holiday that mimicked the already nationally accepted Mother's Day, and on Sunday, June 19, 1910, she held her Father's Day celebration. As it was a more formal gathering, Dodd became the mother of the Father's Day revolution in the U.S., so to speak and Dodd's Father's Day creation as happier than the original, West Virginia version of the same holiday.

"What came to be known as Father's Day was celebrated in various parts of the world and in various ways going back to the Middle Ages or perhaps even before that," Samuel explains. "Through the early decades of the 20th century, Father's Day gradually picked up steam to become the popular holiday it is today in the United States." It wasn't until the 1930s, when Mother's Day had been considered highly commercialized, that major retailers set their sites on Father's Day, aiming to re-create their Mother's Day success. "While many consumers watched their pennies during the Depression, they were eager to show appreciation to their loved ones serving in the military during World War II, laying the foundation for the \$1 billion-plus spending spree it is today," Samuel says of Father's Day's commercial appeal in its beginning stages.

With hesitation and pushback from fathers across the country, Samuel says, it was various American presidents who played a key role in making Father's Day the holiday we know and celebrate today.

"Presidents [Woodrow] Wilson and [Calvin] Coolidge each publicly recognized the day, mostly because they saw it as a good way to improve their image among voters. When they tried to make it a federally endorsed celebration, however, Congress turned them both down," Samuel says. "Jump ahead a few decades, when President Johnson became the first president to officially honor fathers in 1966, and six years later President Nixon successfully established Father's Day as a national holiday. In 1979, President Carter was compelled to officially redeclare Father's Day, and he did just that in April of that year in a nationally televised speech."

Thanks to a publicity boost by various presidents over the course of nearly 100 years, Father's Day came to be more accepted in American society. As a result, the idea of fatherhood changed as well. According to Samuel, President Carter expected fathers to play a more significant role in raising their children and take greater responsibilities within their family life. Father's Day has since become a recognizable institution, with the modern era celebrating fathers in various forms.

Father's Day is much more than a 'Hallmark holiday,' as it is a reminder of the important and sometimes overlooked role that dads play in the lives of children.

"The day is thus a rare opportunity to formally recognize that dads truly matter by bestowing in their children the psychological gifts of confidence, self-esteem, sense of adventure, and sensible risk-taking."

SUMMER SOLSTICE 2021: THE FIRST DAY OF SUMMER

EVERYTHING YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE LONGEST DAY OF THE YEAR



In 2021, the June solstice occurs on Sunday, June 20, marking the start of summer in the Northern Hemisphere. Here's everything you need to know about the summer solstice—the longest day of the year!

THE JUNE SOLSTICE

In the Northern Hemisphere, the **June solstice** (aka summer solstice) occurs when **the** Sun reaches its highest and northernmost points in the sky. This event marks the start of summer in the northern half of the globe. (In the Southern Hemisphere, it's the opposite: the June solstice marks the start of winter, when the Sun is at its lowest point in the sky.)

WHEN IS THE SUMMER SOLSTICE?

In 2021, the June solstice is Sunday, June 20, at 11:32 P.M. EDT. This date marks the official beginning of summer in the Northern Hemisphere, occurring when Earth arrives at the point in its orbit where the North Pole is at its maximum tilt (about 23.5 degrees) toward the Sun, resulting in the longest day and shortest night of the calendar year. (By longest "day," we mean the longest period of sunlight.) At the June solstice, the Northern Hemisphere receives sunlight at the most direct angle of the year.

Note: In the Southern Hemisphere, the June solstice marks the beginning of winter.

WHAT IS THE SUMMER SOLSTICE?

In the Northern Hemisphere, the June solstice (aka summer solstice) occurs when the Sun reaches its highest and northern most points in the sky. It marks the start of summer in the northern half of the globe. (In contrast, the June solstice in the Southern Hemisphere is when the Sun is at its lowest point in the sky, marking the start of winter.)

The word "solstice" comes from Latin *solstitium*—from *sol* (Sun) and *stitium* (still or stopped), reflecting the fact that on the solstice, the Sun appears to stop "moving" in the sky as it reaches its northern- or southernmost point (declination) for the year, as seen from Earth.

After the solstice, the Sun appears to reverse course and head back in the opposite direction. The motion referred to here is the apparent path of the Sun when one views its position in the sky at the same time each day, for example at local noon. Over the year, its path forms a sort of flattened figure eight, called an analemma. Of course, the Sun itself is not moving (unless you consider its own orbit around the Milky Way galaxy); instead, this change in position in the sky that we on Earth notice is caused by the tilt of Earth's axis as it orbits the Sun, as well as Earth's elliptical, rather than circular, orbit.


Does the Solstice Always Occur on the Same Day?

The timing of the June solstice is not based on a specific calendar date or time; it all depends on when the Sun reaches its northernmost point from the equator. Therefore, the solstice won't always occur on the same day. Currently, it shifts between June 20, 21, and 22.

The Year's Longest Day

The Summer Solstice is the day with the longest period of sunlight. Notice how the Sun appears highest in the sky at the solstice; its rays strike Earth at a more direct angle, causing the efficient warming we call summer. Because the Sun is highest in the sky on this day, you'll notice that your shadow (at local, or solar, noon, not clock-time noon) is the shortest that it will be all year. [Local noon is when the Sun crosses the local meridian (an imaginary line between the North and South poles) and is highest in the sky for the day.]

For those who live in the Southern Hemisphere, this is the shortest day of the year and marks the arrival of winter.




