## Home Improvements May Need Approval!!!!

Please remember that exterior changes may need approval from the Architectural Review Board (ARB). To accommodate residents' needs, the ARB meets on Monday's of each month. Applications to be considered need to be turned into the office the Thursday prior to the meeting.

Please plan ahead when planning a project and get your approval early because you then are allowed 6 months to begin the project. ARB applications can be found on our website at www.rlpoa.com under "For Residents" > Forms > Architectural Review Forms. Please select the application required for your project. Some applications do require "plot plans," so contact the office if you do not have one available and we can check to see if we have one on file. <u>ALL APPLICATIONS HAVE TO BE TURNED INTO THE</u> <u>RAINTREE OFFICE—PLEASE DO NOT EMAIL THEM TO THE ARB DIRECTLY.</u>

Here are some of the items that have to be approved: Roof Replacement, Exterior Paint (repainting existing color or new color choice), Fences, Pools, Decks/Patios, Retaining Walls, Play Equipment, and Driveways. This is to name a few.

Failure to receive prior approval will result in a \$200 fine. If you have any questions, contact the office at 816-537-7576.

### Labor Day: What it Means

Labor Day, the first Monday in September, is a creation of the labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country.

### Labor Day Legislation

The first governmental recognition came through municipal ordinances passed in 1885 and 1886. From these, a movement developed to secure state legislation. The first state bill was introduced into the New York legislature, but the first to become law was passed by Oregon on February 21, 1887. During 1887, four more states – Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York – created the Labor Day holiday by legislative enactment. By the end of the decade Connecticut, Nebraska, and Pennsylvania had followed suit. By 1894, 23 more states had adopted the holiday, and on June 28, 1894, Congress passed an act making the first Monday in September of each year a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories.

### Founder of Labor Day

More than a century after the first Labor Day observance, there is still some doubt as to who first proposed the holiday for workers.

Some records show that Peter J. McGuire, general secretary of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners and a co-founder of the American Federation of Labor, was first in suggesting a day to honor those "who from rude nature have delved and carved all the grandeur we behold."

But Peter McGuire's place in Labor Day history has not gone unchallenged. Many believe that Matthew Maguire, a machinist, not Peter McGuire, founded the holiday. Recent research seems to support the contention that Matthew Maguire, later the secretary of Local 344 of the International Association of Machinists in Paterson, N.J., proposed the holiday in 1882 while serving as secretary of the Central Labor Union in New York. What is clear is that the Central Labor Union adopted a Labor Day proposal and appointed a committee to plan a demonstration and picnic.

### Wild foxes roaming area neighborhoods

In the middle of the night, Liesl Christman woke up to screaming from her Shawnee backyard. At first she thought the cry came from a woman or child, but she soon realized she had heard it before. The noise wasn't human; rather, it came from a fox. Such sightings are becoming more common as development encroaches on foxes' habitats, experts say. Residents have spotted foxes in parks, storm drains, backyards and on the street. Diane Johnson, the executive director of <u>Operation Wildlife</u>, a publicly funded clinic and wildlife rehabilitation service in Kansas, has heard of foxes stealing pet toys and shoes from yards, playing with deer, elk and raccoons and eating side-by-side with cats. "I think they're cool animals," Johnson said. "The main thing is getting people past the fear of, 'Oh my God, I saw a fox. It's going to kill everything in the neighborhood.""



### WHY ARE THEY HERE?

The <u>Lakeside Nature Center</u> in Swope Park, knows why we're seeing more foxes. "Every time we as humans deconstruct a wild area to build homes, it forces animals out," said Blessington. "That's temporary though. Once everything gets re-established, animals move back into the space because there aren't all these other places where animals can go live." Foxes survive in human areas partly because they can feast on compost piles, garbage and pet food left outside. Urban environments also offer natural prey like birds, eggs, rabbits, mice and other small rodents. "Our yards provide habitat for things that foxes eat," said Juju Wellemeyer, an agent at <u>K-State Research and Extension in Johnson County</u>. "That naturally just attracts the predators that are going to target those prey items. "Foxes' small size lets them rear their young and build dens in little pockets of nature — or man-made structures. Laurie Dack of Overland Park has spotted foxes in window wells, under houses and in the middle of the street. Christman regularly sees a fox pop in and out of a storm drain as she drives by. "I was out visiting with my neighbor, and in the middle of the street sunning themselves are six foxes," Dack said. "If you're on the sidewalk there might be one following you."

### WILL THEY EAT MY PETS?

Foxes don't seek out cats and dogs as prey. Similar to <u>coyotes</u>, they like to eat rabbit-sized and smaller animals. "They're pretty social animals," said Johnson. "They might take the cat, play with the cat, but they're not looking at the cat as food." Johnson had a fox den under her shed that sheltered a vixen — a female fox — and her six pups. The foxes and her 10 outdoor cats coexisted without any issues. Her toddler daughter sometimes even crawled within 15 feet of the den. The foxes didn't mind. "We never lost a cat. We liked her being there because she actually caught and killed more rats to feed her babies than the barn cats," she said. Foxes are about the same size as cats but look larger because of their long fur. Wellemeyer still recommends that pet owners leave their dogs and cats inside if a fox is roaming the property. "Our pets are curious, so you wouldn't want them to accidentally corner a fox," Wellemeyer said. "So just letting the fox have their space and observing from a safe distance or from your window." Blessington also recommends keeping an eye on small dogs. "If they have small dogs, then don't (let) them out alone," she said. "Take them on a leash or go out with them in the backyard or front yard." Foxes tend to hunt more when they have pups to feed. As the pups grow older, the vixen will take them with her to hunt. Foxes become the greatest threat to pets when they don't have enough food. "When there is a lack of food sources then animals become more opportunistic, but you also have to look at what is a natural prey species," Blessington said.

### WHAT IF THEY'RE IN MY YARD?

Foxes pose little safety risk to humans aside from rare rabies cases. However, humans pose great risk to foxes. The Lakeside Nature Center regularly treats foxes that have been hit by cars. "They're just trying to live as natural a life as they possibly can, and that usually does not involve interacting with humans," Blessington said. People who want foxes off their property should act like "disgruntled landlords" by clapping their hands, yelling and making noise, according to Johnson. They should also reduce potential den sites by removing lumber and brush piles and refrain from leaving out food, water and materials that may attract rodents, Wellemeyer said. However, not everyone wants foxes off their property. "A lot of people really enjoy watching them, and if that's the case, just don't mess with it. Don't bother it," Johnson said. Foxes tend to move away quickly when they see humans, but Wellemeyer recommends giving them plenty of space if they don't leave on their own. If a fox seems unperturbed by the presence of humans and looks underweight and shabby, it's best to call animal control. Those are signs the fox is sick.

Both Operation Wildlife and Lakeside Nature Center educate the public about wildlife and provide care to sick, injured or displaced animals. For example, the center places orphaned pups in fox dens with other pups that are about the same age. The vixen of the den will foster the pups even if they aren't her own. "Because of human population development and lack of habitat, they are coming more and more in contact and conflict with people," Blessington said. "It's just learning how we can coexist with wildlife.

#### TIPS FOR LAKEFRONT HOMEOWNERS :

Scenic lakes have lured families to their shores for generations to fish, boat and swim. Once at the lake, people discover more – like the fun of seeing a line of ducklings paddling toward the shore or the sight of a beautiful blue heron wading through shallow waters. When you buy lakefront property, you assume part of the responsibility of caring for the lake. Your actions on the land as well as in the water affect the health of the lake and everyone's enjoyment of it. If you are thinking about buying lakefront property, this guide is meant for you. A little time invested in learning about lakefront living will pay back sizable dividends in matching your expectations to reality. The quality of a lake is ultimately a reflection of how we take care of its watershed. Healthy watersheds make healthy lakes and higher property values. Natural shorelines full of trees and native plants form the foundation of a healthy lake. As a lakefront property owner, you can help protect the water quality and natural beauty of your lake for yourself, your neighbors, and future generations.

**THE SHORELINE** What's the shoreline like? A natural shoreline generally includes native vegetation that provides shelter, shade, and food for fish and wildlife. Dead tree limbs and branches in the shallow water serve as resting and feeding platforms for ducks and turtles. Aquatic plants provide fish habitat and keep lakes healthy. A natural shoreline also filters out pollutants washing from the land and protects the water's edge against erosion.

AQUATIC PLANTS Aquatic plants are at the root of healthy lakes. Fish and other aquatic life depend on aquatic plants for habitat, food and spawning areas. Native aquatic plant communities also keep undesirable invasive plants in check. Some types of lakes will naturally have a lot of aquatic plants and algae. As lakes become enriched with nutrients, aquatic plant and algae growth tends to increase. What does the lake look like in late summer, a prime time for aquatic plant growth and algae blooms? Are there so many aquatic plants that it might be hard to boat or swim? Easy boat access to the main body of the lake in the spring may become difficult by July. Have blue-green algae blooms, mats, or scum been detected? These algae sometimes release toxins that cause eye and skin irritation or gastrointestinal problems. Is the condition of the lake acceptable to you for your intended uses?

#### **INVASIVE SPECIES**

Are invasive species present in the lake? If so, do they impede swimming and boating? Is there a control program in place? Invasive plants and animals such as Eurasian water-milfoil and zebra mussels are almost impossible to get rid of once they are established. They can also have a negative effect on lakefront property values. Visit www.epa.gov/greatlakes/invasive/ for more information.

**WILDLIFE** The water's edge attracts a variety of birds and wildlife. What types of wildlife are commonly seen at your lake? Open expanses of lawn may attract nuisance populations of geese; shorelines with native trees, shrubs, and plants are less likely to attract them. Can you live with turtles, snakes, ducks, beavers or bears nearby, or with frogs serenading you in the night? If not, perhaps lakefront property is not for you!

**RECREATION SWIMMING** Do you plan to swim in your lake? If so, keep in mind that some shoreline areas may be too shallow, mucky, or weedy for swimming. Your lake may also be closed to swimming for part or all of the year due to high levels of bacteria, algal toxins, or other health concerns. Be sure you know if your lake is swimmable before you buy.

**BOATING AND WATERSKIING** What is the boat traffic like on a summer weekend? Could boat traffic make it unsafe to swim in the lake? Are there any state or local ordinances regulating watercraft speed or time-of-day use? Does the lake have public access? Will you be able to launch your boat? Consider these types of questions if you intend to boat on your lake.

**FISHING** If you plan to fish at your lake, it is important to know if fishing or fish consumption is restricted in any way. Many states issue fishing restrictions due to mercury or other pollutants in fish tissue. Be aware of any fishing advisories or prohibitions that relate to your lake. If fishing is permitted, certain seasonal factors such as winter kill or summer algae blooms can have serious impacts on the fish. What species of fish live in the lake? Is this what you want to catch? Learn more atwww.epa.gov/fish advisories.

Learning about the lake is one of the most important aspects of buying lakefront property. Before you decide where to buy, it is a good idea to spend some time in the area and gather some information. Talk with current landowners, people at the bait shop or marina, county conservationists and lake specialists with your state natural resources agency. If there is a local lake association, talk to some of their members, or better yet attend one of their meetings. In choosing a location, it is important to look not only at characteristics and health of the lake, but also of the surrounding community.

**PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS** July and August are the "dog days" of summer when nutrients and sunlight stimulate plant growth to their fullest. These months are a good time to view the lake when its quality issues could be most apparent. But remember that every year is different. Ask other residents, lake specialists or the county conservationist about the condition of the lake.

## WHEN IS THE FIRST DAY OF FALL IN 2021?

The first day of fall in 2021 arrives on Wednesday, September 22, 2021 at 3:21 p.m. EDT.

## WHAT IS THE FALL EQUINOX?

In mid-September each year, we greet the fall season with the arrival of the fall equinox (otherwise known as the autumnal equinox). This is the moment when the Sun crosses the Equator, and those of us living in the Northern Hemisphere will begin to see more darkness than daylight. Regardless of whether it has been chilly for weeks or there are still balmy summer-like temperatures, this is the start of astronomical fall. This is different from "meteorological fall," which began on September 1st.

At this point, the Earth's tilt is moving away from its maximum lean toward the Sun; its rays are aiming directly at the equator.

The **autumnal (fall) equinox** marks the turning point when darkness begins to win out over daylight. Essentially, our hours of daylight—the period of time each day between sunrise and sunset — have been growing slightly shorter each day since the <u>summer solstice</u> in June, which is the longest day of the year (at least in terms of daylight). Then, for the next three months, our hours of daylight will continue to grow shorter. At the autumnal equinox, day and night are approximately equal in length. The name 'equinox' comes from the Latin word *aequus*, meaning equal, and *nox*, meaning night. An equinox occurs twice a year (Autumnal and Vernal).

Everywhere you look, you can see the visible changes as nature prepares for winter: birds are flying south, temperatures are getting cooler, leaves are changing colors, and animals' coats are thickening, to name a few.

In mid-December, we will experience the winter solstice, which will mark the shortest day of the year in terms of hours of daylight.

After the Winter Solstice, the days will begin to grow longer again. It will take another three months, until the Vernal Equinox (also called the <u>spring equinox</u>) for the periods of daylight and darkness to reach equilibrium once again.

From the vernal equinox, the days will continue to grow longer, until we reach the summer solstice again, and the whole cycle begins anew!

# KEEP GATE CLOSED AT THE BOAT RAMP!

#### The gate at the boat ramp is frequently found standing open! YIKES!!

The gate at the boat ramp is intended to serve as a reminder that every boater at Raintree is responsible for the health of our lake. The closed gate serves to protect the lake from trespassers and invasive species, such as zebra mussels.





# PROTECT OUR LAKE AND YOUR NUMBER ONE INVESTMENT!

Zebra mussels are a very real threat, since they have been identified at a number of locations in Missouri and Kansas. **Zebra mussels can cause significant damage to boats and structures in the lake as well as injury to swimmers—all of which has the potential to reduce property values in our community.** Zebra mussels have few known predators, so once they are in a lake, they are impossible to get rid of. Any boat coming from infested waters can spread Zebra mussels to Raintree Lake. The picture at left is of a prop that is infested with Zebra mussels.

All Raintree boat owners have been provided the code to the gate. It is in red numbers on the "Sunrise and Sunset" chart that you received when you purchased your boat stickers for the season. If you have misplaced this, please call the office at 537-7576 for the code.
